## Look What We're Doing Now

Last year was a very full and productive one for the Foundation and 2014 promises to be busy and challenging, too. See the report on the Annual Meeting for a re-cap of our accomplishments in 2013.

In October Betsy Fields led a Board Retreat that has focused us on the future for our Foundation.

Your Board of Directors is developing a short-, medium- and long-term vision and an aggressive plan of action for the future. We aim to parallel the long-term plan of the City of Winchester to create a vibrant historical area on North Loudoun Street.

We foresee making improvements that will showcase the well and bastion locations in a park-like setting.

We've developed a proposal for the street in front of the property to be marked to show the outline of George Washington's Fort Loudoun, as part of the City's utilities upgrade on North Loudoun Street in 2016.

Our Long Term vision is to upgrade the house at our site as a high-tech Resource Center for the public, to promote activities in line with our mission. It will be a magnet for visitors and a hub of knowledge about the French and Indian War and the early career of George Washington.

The Foundation is working hard to get Fort Loudoun recognized as the important historical site that it is. How fast we can proceed will depend almost entirely upon finding sources of significant funding, first to pay off the existing \$163,000 mortgage on the Fort Loudoun property at 419 North Loudoun Street, and then make the improvements needed at the site to make it a modern Resource Center in a park-like setting.

We want the full involvement of our members. ## Some 2013 Accomplishments

- \* We have been accepted to the Virginia Landmarks Register. Our nomination has been forwarded for consideration for the National Register.
- \* We have in place the first Audio Tour in Winchester of our site.



- \* The public alleyway, to the left of the house, has been repaired and paved, we are grateful to the City of Winchester for our having accomplished this.
- \* First Scots-Irish Dinner was held in March and proved a success.
- \* Conducted a video survey of the fort's original well, filming underwater to a depth of 75 feet, where silt was encountered for the remainder of the 103 foot depth.
- \* Ft. Loudoun: the house roof was painted and some rooms were painted. Maintenance and improvements to our yard were completed (new parking places).
- \* A board retreat was held on October 28th at the George Washington Hotel, led by mediator Betsy Fields. This was a tremendous help for future planning.
- \* Bus Tour from Alexandria with 45 people toured Ft. Loudoun on November 2nd.
- \* Our website now takes Pay Pal and we sell various books on the F&I War.

On November 10, 36 members gathered in the Woltz Pavilion at the Godfrey Miller Home on Loudoun Street to observe the Foundation's 12<sup>th</sup> year of service. President Linda Ross began the business meeting with the sad news of the passing of two of our long time members in the past year. Dick Stephenson, a former board member, and former US Senator Harry F. Byrd, Jr. a Soldier in the Foundation, were both friends and supporters and will be sorely missed.

Dr. Carl Ekberg and Roberta Munske were elected to additional 3 year terms on the Board of Directors along with a newcomer, David Grosso. All three have terms through 2016.

Treasurer Jim Shipp reported on expenses and income, and that our 501(c)(3) tax exempt status is secure. We received a grant of \$1,000 from the Woltz-Winchester Foundation, and overall our finances are stable but could use a little bolstering.

**Building and Grounds** chair Linda Ross reported that the Baker-Hardy House is in good shape and that we have tenants. We accomplished several major projects during the year, including painting the metal roof and several interior rooms, and removal of a number of trees and shrubs resulting in creation of several parking spaces. We are grateful that the City of Winchester repaired and paved the public alley adjoining the south side of our property. The house remains the largest cost of the foundation, but also a major source of income. A goal is to reduce or eliminate the mortgage.

**Education and Outreach** co-chair Susan Emmart reported on the second Essay Contest, which focused on the Fry/Jefferson Map of this area. The winner, Ms. Sydney Shepherd, read her essay at Fort Loudoun Day and accepted the \$500 prize. A Scots-Irish Dinner event held at the George Washington Hotel in March was a great success, both in fund-raising and in community outreach. Co-chair Scott Straub reported on the new Cell Phone Tour activated this fall. Anyone can simply call 703-574-6110 and receive an audio tour of the site of Fort Loudoun. An attractive sign has been installed at the front of the property giving instruction and information on the site to assist the user in locating points of interest. Scott also gave a presentation of his contacts with The History Channel regarding a possible program to explore the well dug during the construction of Fort Loudoun.

Steve Resan was instrumental in securing the free services of a New York firm which conducted a video survey of the fort's original well, filming underwater to a depth of 75 feet, where silt was encountered for the remainder of the 103 foot depth. A major accomplishment was listing the Fort Loudoun site on the Virginia Landmarks Register, with a nomination forwarded for consideration for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

A Board planning retreat was led by facilitator Betsy Fields in October. The Alexandria Association brought 45 people on a bus trip who toured the site in November. Many purchased copies of the new Braddock's Road book, by our Historian, Norman Baker. That book and other publications are now available on our web site, [fiwf.org](http://fiwf.org), where PayPal payments are accepted.

**Membership** chair Roberta Munske reported we have 239 names on our mailing list, with 90 paid members, including Soldiers. She introduced new Board member David Grosso as the person who will manage the membership and mailing lists.

We had a special award this year presented to Scott Straub; a plaque featuring a letter from Winchester Mayor Elizabeth Minor commending Scott on his efforts for the first-ever Cell Phone Tour in Winchester.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual **Leo Bernstein Award** was presented by Linda Ross to Congressman Frank Wolf who has represented this district in the U.S. Congress since 1982. Mr. Wolf has been influential in obtaining grants for the Foundation and has demonstrated a dedication to history and to helping our Foundation. Dave Stegmaier from Mr. Wolf's office accepted the award of a gorget on behalf of the Congressman.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual **Judge Robert Woltz Award for History** was presented by Steve Resan to Norman Baker for his contributions to the Foundation, including his new book "Braddock's Road: Mapping the British Expedition from Alexandria to the Monongahela" as well as his continuing efforts in interpreting the history of this era. Norman received a gorget.

The **Fort Loudoun Award** for service to the Foundation was presented by Linda Ross and Steve Resan to Alan Morrison for his years of dedication to the Foundation and continuing efforts in many areas.

After the business meeting was adjourned, Dr. David Clark, an area archeologist who participated in the small dig in 2007 at Fort Loudoun, did a presentation on "The Soldier's Mess and the Meat Diet", detailing many of his discoveries during the 2007 project.

# The Well Digger at Fort Loudoun

In 1757, George Washington commissioned Johann Christoph Heintz to dig a well at Fort Loudoun in Winchester, VA. Variations of Heintz's name show up in letters and journals, but it is undoubtedly the same man.

As I was researching Heintz, I came across a Family Tree website that provided additional information about the family. Heintz was born in Germany before 1737 and was listed at the State House at Philadelphia, among the "foreigners imported in the Snow Good Intent, John Lasly, Commander, from Amsterdam and last from Gosport, qualified the 23<sup>rd</sup> October, 1754." The people onboard came from Hesse, Hanau, the Palatinate and Switzerland.

Other references to Heintz, and his well digging can be found in George Washington's Account book or letters. The Account book listings can be found as listed:





Further evidence of Heintz's presence in Winchester can be found at Mt. Hebron Cemetery on the side of the last remaining wall of the Old Lutheran Church.



The Heintz name is also mentioned in a land grant from Lord Fairfax.

"The Right Honourable Thomas Lord Fairfax Baron of Cameron in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland Proprietor of the Northern Neck of Virginia – To all to whom this present visiting shall come sends Greeting – Know ye that for good causes for & in Consideration of the amount of the annual rents & Covenants herein

after reserved & exercised I have given granted & confirmed & by these Presents for me my Heirs & Assigns do give and grant & confirm unto *Magdalene Heintz of Frederick County for & during the terms of her natural life & after her Decease to her son Christopher Heintz one certain Lot or half Acre of Land situate lying & being in an Addition to the Town of Winchester in the said County & within my said Propriety, it being the Lot No. 192, bounded on the Southward Side by Pallmall Street, on the Westward End by the Lot No. 215, on the Northward Side by the Lot No. 193 and on the eastward End by Cameron Street as by a Survey & Plot thereof made by Mr. John Baylis dated January the 1st 1758 –*

The Heintz Family lived at Lot 192 which occupied 1/2 of the block on Cameron Street in 1758; this probably allowed room for a house, a garden and some animals (chickens, pigs, horses). In later years, the lot was subdivided which allowed two more houses to be built on it.

Johann was married to Magdelene and had 2 sons, George and Christopher. Both sons served in the military during the Revolutionary War. From their pension applications, it can be seen that George fought at the Battle of Guilford in SC. Christopher guarded prisoners brought back to Winchester from the British defeat at the Battle of Saratoga. Both sons changed the spelling of their last name to "Haynes" and "Hains", respectively.

State of Tennessee, Washington County, July 1819

Be it remembered that on the 19th day of July 1819 George Haynes personally appeared in open court aged 62 and being desirous of availing himself of the provision of an act of Congress entitled an act of provide for certain persons who were engaged in the Revolutionary War, etc., "That he the said George Haynes, some time in the Revolutionary War at what time he cannot now recollect, enlisted in the continental service in the County of Frederick, State of Virginia in the first Regiment of Cavalry of the Virginia line for three years under Captain Fentleroy of Major Bellfields' Command that *after his enlistment was taken to Charleston S.C. and at the Battle of Guilford his Captain (Fentleroy) was killed and he was put under Captain Gunn of 1st Regiment in which he was enlisted- Captain Gunn was replaced by Captain Henry Bayer by whom he was discharged in the State of Virginia at Staunton after having faithfully served out three years which discharge he kept for some time and never having drawn any of his pay he put the said discharge into the hands of Martin Fetner to draw his pay for him from whom he has never heard since but supposes said Fenton may have drawn thereon and pocketed it from which circumstance he now has not the power to produce said discharge. James Sevier, Clerk; also Iarat Brown, John Patton, McCollom H.M. Bayles"*


"!Pension papers of Christopher Hains- Revolutionary Army W8896

!State of Tennessee September the 29th 1832  
Washington County

! On this day and date above personally appeared before me,

Levi Bowers one of the acting Justices of the Peace in and for the County and State aforesaid, George Haines, the affiant, and who after first being sworn by me deposed and stated that some time in the same years after the surrender of Burgoyne, in 1777, this deponent knew of Christopher Haines, entering into the army of the Revolution for two years; that said Christopher at the time resided in the County of Frederick, State of Virginia, and in the year 1777. as well as now \_\_\_\_\_, entered in Winchester under Captain Ghilkerson or Gilkerson for two years, said enlistment was at the time that the British prisoners taken at Burgoyne defeat were brought to Winchester, and the said *Christopher Haynes entered for the purpose of guarding said prisoners, and this affiant knew of his remaining at Winchester as one of the guard until said prisoners were removed from that place, which, he thinks, was Philadelphia, when said Christopher left Winchester under his aforesaid Captain and was at \_\_\_\_\_ until the expiration of his time, in the army. \_\_\_\_\_ did not see him after his departure form Winchester but saw him go with the troops from Winchester. and frequently heard of the said Christopher being in service afterward, but \_\_\_\_\_ was himself taken into the army and out into the southern*

cavalry and Christopher was of the infantry in the north. \_\_\_\_\_ also understood from others that said Christopher Haynes entered the militia service after being discharged from the regular army. “

Johann Christoph Heintz's efforts to find fresh spring water may have been frustrated by runoff and seepage water, but the solid rock well he blasted out to a depth of 103 feet may turn out to be the ultimate time capsule. There are approximately 28 feet of sediment and silt at the bottom of that well that may hold artifacts dating from the early 1930's back to 1757.

## NEW BOARD MEMBER BIOS




