# Early Valley Settlement: One Family's Contribution

On February 20th, the FIWF hosted a George Washington Birthday Celebration at the Winchester Brew Works on Cameron Street. For the second year, Brew Works owners Bonnie Landy and Holly Redding provided the Foundation and its guests a delicious beer called "Fort Loudoun Lager".

The event was all but sold out with nearly 100 guests attending. In addition to pizza from Claudio's Pizzeria, attendees received a commemorative stainless-steel mug and two pints of lager. Historian, Jim Moyer, provided a presentation that explained why George Washington actually has two birth dates! Originally, George was born on February 11, 1731, but when King George decreed (in 1754) that England and all of its colonies were moving from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar, that date had to be retroactively changed to February 22, 1732. From all accounts, everyone had a very good time.

Middletown mayor Charles Harbaugh IV engaged the crowd with his portrayal of young George Washington and was on hand to accommodate many requests for pictures. Rebecca Meyle conducted a raffle for 10 growlers of Fort Loudoun Lager, and Donna Leight managed to sell books, prints and mugs, with the combined efforts raising hundreds of dollars for the Foundation.

Captain George Mercer's Company (under the direction of Tony Elar) conducted exercises at the Fort Loudoun site prior to the celebration and also drew quite the crowd.

Overall, the day's activities were a success and will likely be repeated again next year. Huzzah!

tion for a Ground Penetrating Radar project, but Eric knew that the dirt might also have trace artifacts from yesteryear. He diligently sifted the soil and did find pieces of pottery and other items of interest. The artifacts have not yet been dated, but have been set aside for future study. The Foundation wishes to thank Eric for his volunteer work and keen eye in finding and securing these items."

As has been a long tradition, our first event of 2023 was the celebration of the anniversary of the birth of George Washington, the 291<sup>st</sup>. Many thanks to Scott Straub, Rebecca Meyle and their helpers for making this another successful, fun event.

April will find us hosting an historic house tour to Springdale House on Valley Pike South of Winchester. The house built by John Hite dates to 1753. The grounds also include the remains of Hite's Tavern (frequented by George Washington). The tour will include a visit to the nearby historic Bartonsville Mill. The tour sold out early, but we hope to continue to offer members opportunities to visit other historic sites in the region on a recurring basis in the future. Stay tuned!

In May we will again host Fort Loudoun Day, May 13. Following the success of last year's commemoration, we will again place added emphasis on the F&IW era and the role of the fort in events of the time with some tweaks that we hope will improve on the presentation.

For later events, such as the re-creation of the 1758 election of George Washington to his first elective office from Frederick County, you will be receiving notifications for opportunities to join us as details are finalized and as the time for events approach. We hope to see you at one or more of these events. We will be continuing our outreach as well by attending various Colonial History events sponsored by other like-minded organizations throughout the region.




